- 5. We will do diverse projects from supporting legislative action to community projects.


Join us, all are welcome at the 10am meetings in the "chair room" on the first Sunday of each month.

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Children's Garden

Teaching our Children About Giving

Since our previous "little green church" was across the street from Astoria's Community Gardens it was an easy decision to have the children's summer activities be a garden. Thus the Children's Garden was born. The RE teaches and parents, including Forest Duggan, shown at left, set up the garden. It has become a PUUF tradition and Forest leads the kids in the planting, weeding and harvesting each year. Then he and the kids take the crop to the Clatsop County Food Bank.

In our first year, 2013, the harvest was 200 lbs, 2014 was 300, 2015 was 400. Then we moved to our present location. Forest worked with Home Depot to have the building supplies donated and then built the current beds in the back of the PAC parking lot. The first year was difficult and no product survived. In 2017 we harvested one tomato (always appreciate what we are given.) But a revival happened in 2017 as 225 lbs plus 175 bulbs of garlic were donated. This year the soil is well prepared, and starts are ready for use so Forest predicts 500 lbs will be harvested.

The all organic garden will have carrots, sunflowers, peas, cucumbers, squash, zucchini, cabbage, brussel sprouts, corn, strawberries, artichokes, garlic, potatoes, and tomatoes. All in those few boxes. In addition to the vegetables Forest and the children have done the spring weeding of PAC's flower beds. They are looking good as the picture shows.

"The kids are happiest when outside" says Forest, and "there is no wrong way to plant and work in a garden. Everyone has a different way, and as long as it is safe, most ways work." Forest goes on to say that although the harvest is what's fun, the hard work and putting in the effort is what makes it rewarding. They even learned from the failure of 2016 and 2017. They learned why and went on to make 2018 work.

Watering help from members of PUUf may be needed this year although Forest hopes to install a watering system that runs across the parking lot. Permission from the PAC will needed. So let's all hope for a good balance of sun and rain to get that 500 lbs.
